AIR SUSPENSION COMPRESSOR ASSEMBLY REMOVAL

- 1. SET THE STEERING TO STRAIGHT AHEAD.
- 2. RAISE THE VEHICLE.
- 3. REMOVE PROTECTIVE SHROUD FROM UNDERTHE REAR OF THE VEHICLE TO ACCESS THE COMPRESSOR. (FIGURES A, B)



5. DISCONNECTTHE RUBBER INTAKE HOSE. (FIGURE F)





1. REMOVE THE AIR LINE FROM THE COMPRESSOR. (FIGURE K)

2. REMOVE THE AIR LINE FITTING FROM THE AIR HOSE BY SLIDING THE THREADED PORTION UP THE LINE AND SPREADING THE COLLET OPEN. SLIDE THE AIR FITTING OFF THE AIR LINE. (FIGURES L)

Tighten all nuts and bolts to manufacturer's specifications during the installation process.




Do not remove the air fitting from the air suspension compressor. Doing so may cause damage and/or void warranty. Remove the white shipping pin from the new air fitting and insert the air line until fully seated.

3. REATTACHTHE RED (UPPER) AND BLUE (LOWER) AIR LINES. (FIGURE U)



PROPER PROCEDURE FOR ASSESSING YOUR AIR SPRINGS CONDITION:

- 1. TURN OFF AIR SUSPENSION SWITCH IF EQUIPPED.
- 2. REFERTO OWNER'S MANUAL FOR PROPER LIFTING TECHNIQUES AND JACKING POINTS.
- 3. RAISE THE VEHICLE.
- 4. INSPECT AIR SPRINGS FOR ANY TYPE OF CRACKS OR EXCESSIVE WEAR. CRACKS IN AIR SPRINGS ARE EVIDENT IF THEY ARE LEAKING. THIS WILL CAUSE THE COMPRESSOR TO OVERHEAT FROM CONTINUOUS OPERATION.

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
